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Student Starts Dress Code Controversy

Case Western Reserve University second-year Andrew Lee is currently suing the CWRU administration for not having a dress code, claiming that he is currently failing calculus because he is 'too distracted' by a female classmate's exposed shoulders.

"It's not fair. How am I supposed to do well in class when she shows up here every day in her off-the-shoulder tops and cold-shoulder sweaters? I just can't think right, her shoulders are just way too attractive."

The student in question, first-year Veronica Wells, objected to this claim, stating that she has worn a maximum of two shirts with exposed shoulders in the past month and that it's impossible for her to be the reason he is failing because Lee

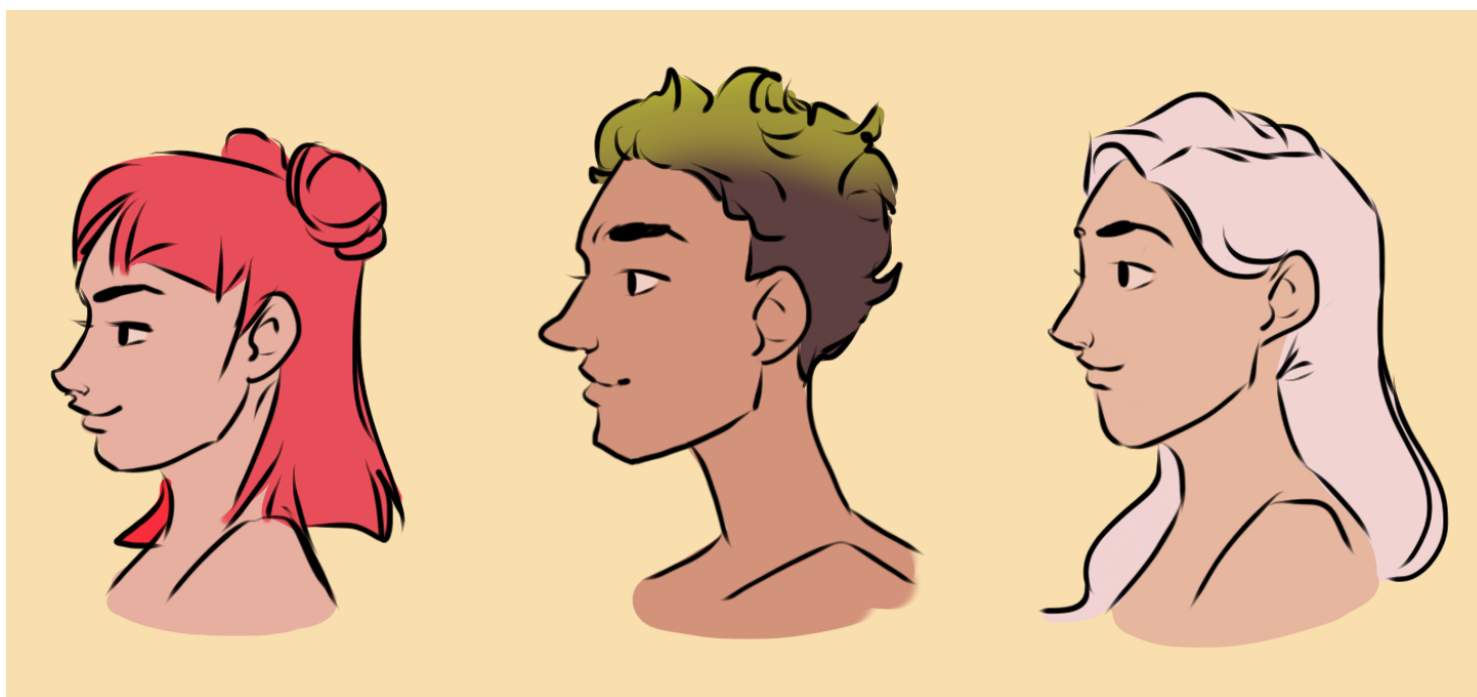

People with tattoos given job priority/college admittance preference

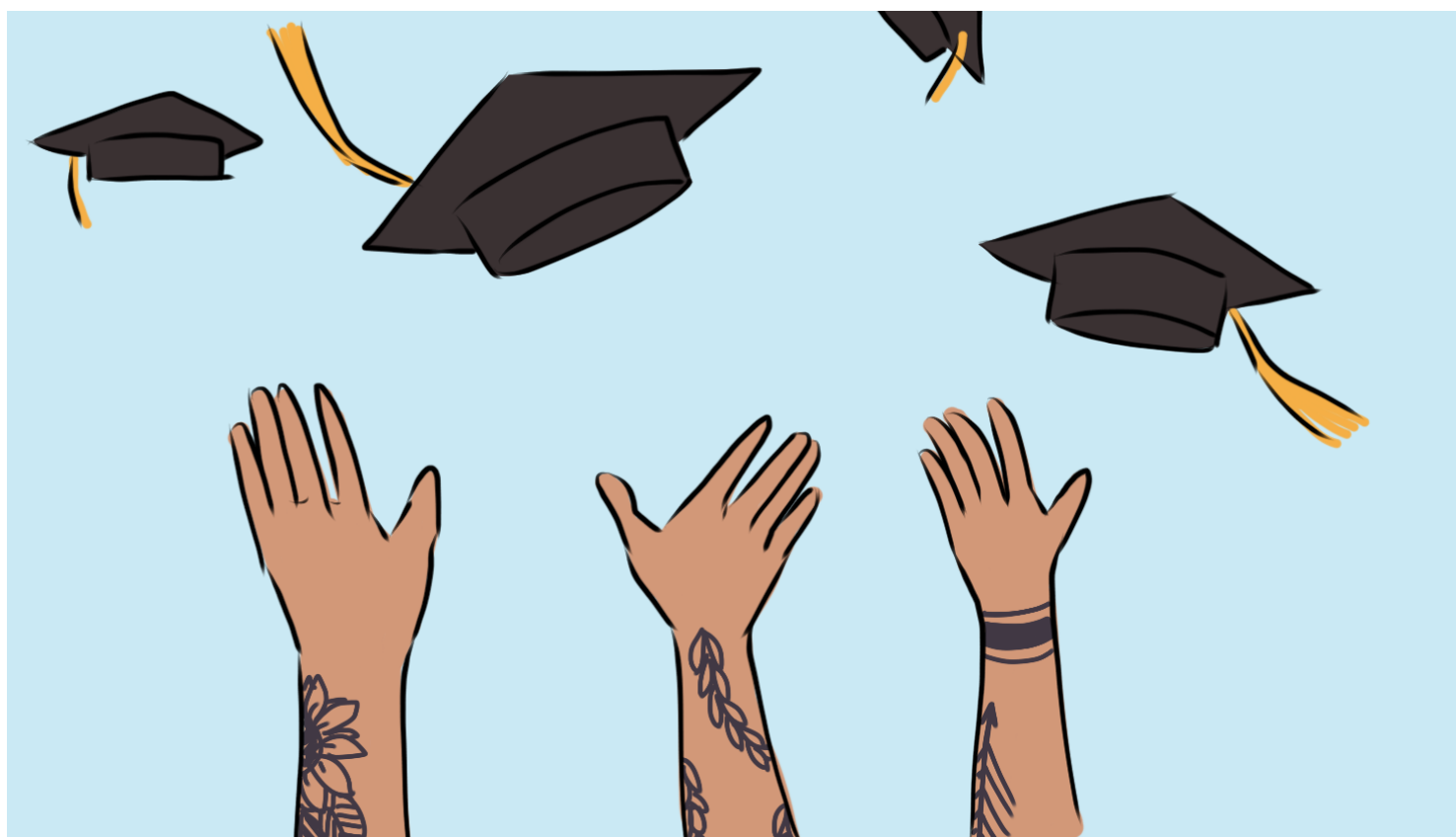

I assure you that the practicality of

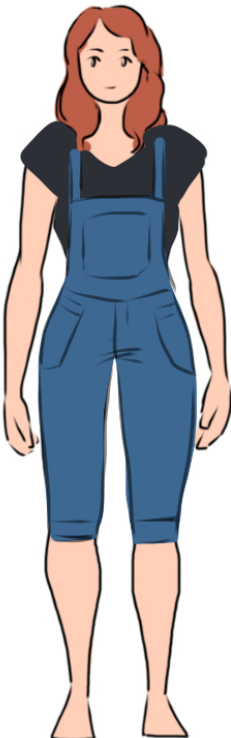

3. Doesn't go with every outfit

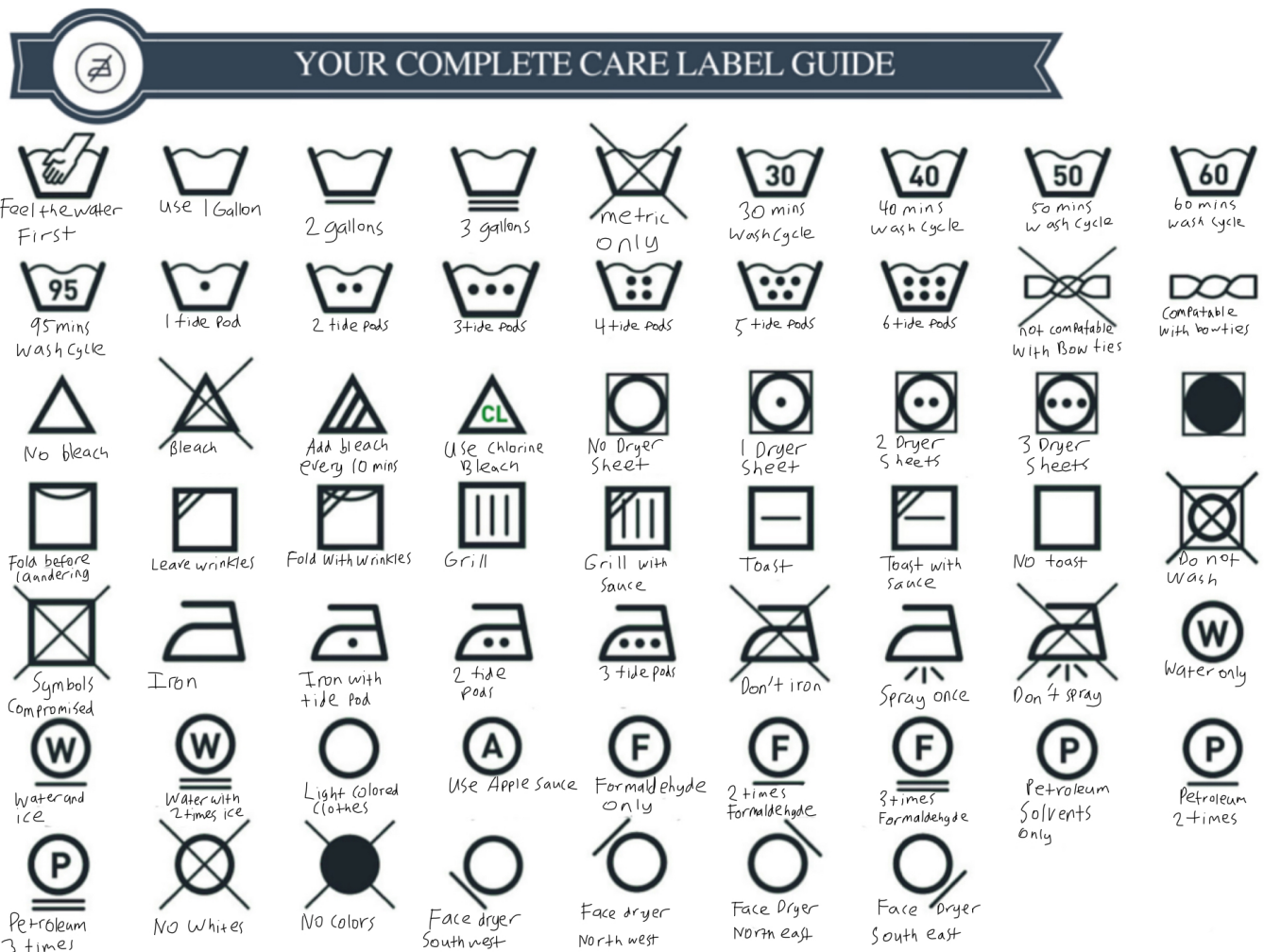
Or any outfit.
